The Lighthouse was established in 1963 and now has close to 50 team members. We are primarily engaged in the production of writing instruments and over the years have developed several unique pens for niche markets. We are celebrating our 45<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year.

The West Texas Lighthouse is a private, not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization which is affiliated with the National Industries for the Blind (NIB) and Texas Industries for the Blind and Handicapped (TIBH). The majority of our income comes from the products we make and sell. We do, however, appreciate monetary donations and have many Friends of the Lighthouse who are long time contributors.
